## Reflection Corner

This Sunday's Gospel is yet another parable about the kingdom of heaven. What is the kingdom of heaven like? The difference is that this time Jesus is describing not so much the kingdom that we can experience here and now, but is referring to either our own death or the end times. Jesus is the bridegroom who is coming. We don't know where or when, but we need to be prepared when He finally returns.

The important point to consider is preparation. When we really want something that we look forward to, we prepare for it. We make sure we do everything necessary to make it happen. Preparations can also make something near to us that seems far off. What does it mean to prepare? None of us want to think about our death. It is hard to prepare for something without thinking about it, and planning for it. Even our old age is something difficult to prepare for because we want to think that it is still in the remote future. And the fear of the unknown, of our own mortality really scare us. That means we are not prepared.

We don't think much of our death right now because we think we have a whole lifetime to worry about it. But when we have to face sickness due to aging or unhealthy lifestyle, then we start taking care of our future and how we can live longer as if there is no eternity after this life on earth. And somehow the thought of dying creeps into our consciousness. Like a graduation, heaven is an abstract concept while it remains a remote possibility. And it will remain remote as long as we are not actually preparing for it. But most of us do not make much preparation for heaven. We tend to think there will be time to think about that later on. Then suddenly we find ourselves at the end of our lives, having made little or no effort to "know, love and serve" God. And the only explanation we give for placing business, pleasure or the development of body and mind ahead of the development of our spiritual lives will be "It just seemed more important at the time!" What preparation brings is inner peace, a freedom that many people don't seem to have. Similarly, by not being in



denial of death but rather preparing ourselves for its occurrence and by living for eternity now we will get ourselves ready to meet our God who alone can give us true and eternal peace. The other realization is no one can provide for you what you need. The fire of God comes from within and no one can give it to us. We must take responsibility for the power of God within and not expect that someone can give us God.

The final message then is Jesus' words: "Stay awake!" Prayer ultimately is learning how to stay awake. Prayer is paying attention. Unfortunately, we get stuck with prayer by reciting what we have memorized. Praying is more than just recitation of prayers. It is about staying awake and paying attention to God who wants to be the center of our life and our eternal goal.

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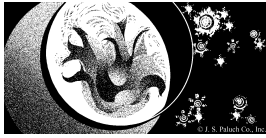

#### SAINT OF THE WEEK November 13

#### St. Frances Xavier Cabrini (1850-1917)

Refused admission to the religious order which had educated her to be a teacher, Frances Cabrini began charitable work at the House of Providence Orphanage in Cadogno, Italy. In September 1877, she made her vows there and took the religious habit. When the bishop closed the orphanage in 1880, he named Frances prioress of the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart. Seven young women from the orphanage joined with her.

Since her early childhood in Italy, Frances had wanted to be a missionary in China but, at the urging of Pope Leo XIII, Frances went west instead of east. She traveled with six sisters to New York City to work with the thousands of Italian immigrants living there.

She found disappointment and difficulties with every step. When she arrived in New York City, the house intended to be her first orphanage in the United States was not available. The archbishop advised her to return to Italy. But Frances, truly a valiant woman, departed from the archbishop's residence all the more determined to establish that orphanage. And she succeeded.

In 35 years Frances Xavier Cabrini founded 67 institutions dedicated to caring for the poor, the abandoned, the uneducated and the sick. Seeing great need among Italian immigrants who were losing their faith, she organized schools and adult education classes. She died of malaria in her own Columbus Hospital in Chicago. Frances Xavier Cabrini was the first United States citizen to be canonized.

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#### EL SANTO DE LA SEMANA 13 DE NOVIEMBRE

#### SANTA FRANCISCA XAVIER CABRINI (1850-1917)

Negándosele la admisión a la orden religiosa que la había educado para ser maestra, Francesca Cabrini empezó a trabajar caritativamente en la Casa del Orfanatorio de la Providencia en Cadogno, Italia. En Septiembre 1877, pronuncio los votos y tomó el hábito religioso. Cuando el obispo cerró el orfanato en 1880, nombró Francesca priora de las Hermanas Misioneras del Sagrado Corazón. Siete mujeres jóvenes del orfanatorio se unieron a ella.

Desde su temprana niñez en Italia, Francesca había querido ser misionera en la China pero a petición del Papa Leo XIII, Francesca se fue hacia el oeste en vez del este. Ella viajó con seis hermanas a la Ciudad de Nueva York para trabajar con los millares de inmigrantes italianos que vivían allí. Ahí encontró desilusión y dificultad a cada paso. Cuando llegó a la Ciudad de Nueva York, la casa que pensó iba a ser su primer orfanatorio en los Estados Unidos no se encontraba disponible. El arzobispo le aconsejó volver a Italia. Pero Francesca, sinceramente una mujer valerosa, partió de la residencia del arzobispo determinada a establecer el orfanatorio. Y triunfó.

En 35 años, Francesca Xavier Cabrini fundó 67 instituciones dedicadas a cuidar de los pobres, huérfanos, incultos y enfermos. Viendo una gran necesidad entre los inmigrantes italianos que perdían su Fé, organizó escuelas y clases de educación para los adultos. Ella murió de malaria en su propio Hospital de Colón en Chicago. Francesca Xavier Cabrini fue la primera ciudadana de Estados Unidos en ser canonizada.

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## Mensaje para Reflexionar


En el otoño, al ver las hojas secarse y caer por doquier, y las noches hacerse más largas, es natural que nuestros pensamientos se dirijan al fin de nuestra vida. Puede que nos preguntemos si estaremos listos cuando el Señor venga a nuestro encuentro. Tal vez hemos vivido la muerte súbita e inesperada de un ser amado. Quizá hayamos hecho vigilia junto a alguien que murió lentamente. De ser así, sabemos que la muerte es una realidad impredecible y siempre presente en cada vida humana.

¿Cómo hemos de vivir nuestras vidas ante tal conocimiento? ¿Qué es lo sabio y prudente? La Sagrada Escritura de hoy trata sobre estas preguntas. No hemos de vivir como si fuéramos inmortales y nadie pudiera hacernos daño. Tampoco hemos de vivir en temor y desesperanza, como si ya estuviéramos muertos. Pablo dice a los tesalonicenses que se consuelen unos a otros con el conocimiento de que nos reuniremos con nuestros seres queridos en la eternidad. Jesús dice a sus discípulos que no sean necios y piensen que basta tener apenas un mínimo de fe, esperanza y amor.

¿Cómo, entonces, debemos vivir nuestras vidas? Se nos dice que estemos preparados y “permanezcamos despiertos”. ¿Qué significa eso? Significa que avivemos nuestro espíritu con fe, esperanza y amor, para que nuestras “lámparas” no se apaguen demasiado pronto. Significa que continuamente busquemos la sabiduría, especialmente en los tiempos oscuros del sufrimiento. Significa que estemos siempre listos para la venida del Señor en momentos inesperados, para su enseñanza de lecciones inesperadas, para que nos traiga alegrías inesperadas, aun en situaciones inesperadas. Entonces, al momento de morir, estaremos preparados, porque habremos adquirido el hábito de buscar al Señor y recibirlo.

**Adolescentes y alcohol: tentaciones COVID**
